Conference Take aways:

It was so interesting to hear about what other CF's are doing in the different countries.

On the first day of the conference many CF's talked about their successes, their challenges as well as telling us about many of the projects they fund.

In the afternoon, we were paired with leaders from CF's very different from ours. I was paired with Andrea Saena, COE of the Chicago Community Trust. They are a very large foundation and fund projects that address poverty, crime, substance abuse and brain health. They do a lot of their own charitable activities and direct funding.

The following day were site visits. The first was to the Northeast Iowa Community College in Dubuque, Iowa. There we met folks who work for non-profit organizations who were given grants from the foundation in Dubuque.

We met Carol who works at the college and is the manager of a program that receives grants to assist people attend college who would not be able to otherwise.

We also met Carmain who works for the housing department for the city of Dubuque. She assists people struggling with poverty with rent reduction.

The third person was Caprice Jones who is the founder and ED of the Fountain of Youth. He was a very inspirational person. He grew up in extreme poverty and spent most of his youth in detention centers and the first 20 years as an adult in and out of prison. One day he had a vision and completely turned his life around. He now works hard to help change the mindset of those struggling with generational poverty, one person at a time.

After lunch we went to the Crescent Community Health Center where they provide highquality, respectful, affordable, and comprehensive care to improve the health and wellbeing of their communities. They provide medical, dental and brain health services. Most of the doctor, dentists and therapist's volunteer. They run 100% on donations and grants. The foundation in Dubuque has provided them with many grants.

I love that in Iowa, they call mental health, brain health. This has helped break the stigma and more professionals in their community have spoken out about receiving help with brain health.

That evening we went for dinner at the museum in Dubuque. It has been completely restored, with the help of the foundation in Dubuque.

The Dubuque Foundation runs a program called Small Towns Dream Program. They reserve 10% of their annual granting allocation to this program. It is made up of their ED as well as several other community people who decide on which community challenges to fund. There is no application, only a small grant agreement and a final report. It has been very successful in assisting high risk people overcome issues that affect their lives. One example is a single mother who had a brain tumor and could not pay her rent for three months as she needed to recover from brain surgery and treatment but went back to work shortly thereafter.

The whole trip was a wonderful experience but left me wondering if CFPD could do more to provide assistance to our community's most vulnerable such as people living in poverty, people with substance abuse issues and people suffering with brain health.
